*3\* Suppose a 16-year old has met the requirements for high school graduation and has the skills to function as an adult in society. Would it be better for that young person to finish high school, go to college early, or go to work right away and start a career?*

- 41% Finish high school
- 34% Go to college early
- 12% Go to work right away and start a career
- 12% Not sure

*4\* Over the past few decades, going to college has become far more expensive. Is that primarily because the quality of college education has improved greatly or because the federal government has subsidized the cost of college with student loans and other funding?*

- 17% The quality has improved greatly
- 60% The federal government has subsidized the cost with student loans
- 23% Not sure

**Methodology**

This survey of 1,000 Registered Voters was conducted online by Scott Rasmussen on June 22-23, 2026. Field work for the survey was conducted by RMG Research, Inc. Certain quotas were applied, and the sample was lightly weighted by geography, gender, age, race, education, internet usage, and political party to reasonably reflect the nation's population of Registered Voters. Other variables were reviewed to ensure that the final sample is representative of that population.

The margin of sampling error for the full sample is +/- 3.1 percentage points.
